

• Special Education Panel Discussions and Workshops:

This first panel discussion was a "Know Your Rights" special education discussion, which included panelists from the Children's Law Center, Advocates for Justice and Education, the Office of the Ombudsman for Public Education, Family Voices of DC, and a parent advocate. The first panel discussion was held on Monday, November 9th at 6:30pm at the William O. Lockridge Library in Ward 8. This panel was the first of a series of panel discussions focused on a variety of special education topics.

• Enrollment: Navigating the Enrollment Process:

I am partnering with DCPCSB, DCPS, DC School Reform Now, and My School DC to do a series of parent-focused events that help families navigate the school enrollment and selection process.

Webinar-parent testimonies:

Like an online report card, we want to make school by school information accessible so that parents have all information about what the school provides that is relevant to their children's life as well as their life. This includes needs such as after school care, transportation, special education, etc.
